

Maths Word

'Binary' is a way of counting that uses only the digits 0 and 1. This is done by making all the column headings powers of 2, rather than the usual powers of 10.

Puzzle

Usain Bolt recently won a gold medal for running the 100m in 9.81 seconds.⁴ Imagine the following scenario:

Let's say that when he crossed the finish line, the runner in second place was 10 metres behind him, and that both Bolt and the runner in second place ran at a constant speed for the whole 100m (although obviously they both had different constant speeds). Now they run the race again, this time with Bolt starting 10 metres behind the starting line. If they run at the same constant speeds as before, who will win the race this time?


"Mathematics is not about numbers so much as it is a way of thinking, a way of framing questions that allows us to turn things inside out and upside down to get a better sense of their true nature."

The perimeter of the larger rectangle is 308 cm.


Find the perimeter of one of the smaller rectangles.
