Dear Parents and Carers,

I hope you enjoy reading the articles in this edition of the Chronicle. It has been a very busy half term with many aspects of school life almost returning to normal. It was really brilliant to welcome back visitors into school for the Show Choir production of Matilda and Chicago. My thanks to the staff and students who put in hours of work, starting way back in September; their dedication really paid off. At times through December and January we were challenged by the rise in infection rates and it was sometimes difficult to see how we might manage a live performance. Year 7 Trip to St Martin's

On Tuesday 25th January (7X & 7Y) and Thursday 27th January (7V, 7W & 7Z), we went to Saint Martin's church in the Bullring as part of our Religious Studies curriculum. I was a bit nervous as it was my first secondary school trip, but the moment I stepped in, it was like a gateway of amazement and life. Mrs Woodward showed us around and told us many fascinating stories on how the church was built. She told us the story about the real St Martin, a soldier in the Roman army who helped others. As we explored the church she told us its history and how it was one of many that had been on that site. Her words intrigued me so I wanted to find out more. I looked around, and found an information sheet on the wall that told me that many Saxon churches were originally built on that site. I was astonished, as I was not only walking on top of centuries of history, but also walking in the footsteps of others who had visited, just like me.

Mrs Woodward was also kind enough to show us the font at the back of the church. It was like a water fountain but for baptising people into the Christian faith. She demonstrated a baptism with a fake baby, we named him Bob!

At the east side of the church there is a huge stained glass window known as the healing window. This is because it has paintings of a cross surrounded by Jesus healing different people on it. It was designed just after WW2, when the old window was destroyed by a bomb.

We had a great time, learned lots of interesting facts and admired the beautiful architecture, artwork and the stained glass windows.

Mrs Woodward was very kind, and even allowed us to try playing the organ. That was cool, although it was too loud for me!

All in all, we had a great time at St Martin's, and it was great being able to go on trips again after such a long time. Thank you to Mrs Woodward!

The Stephen Spender Poetry in Translation Prize, celebrating multilingualism and literary translation, is inspired by the cultural activism of Stephen Spender, poet and champion of international literature. This year, I was fortunate enough to win in the Under 16 category, after entering a Bengali poem, "Kolkata's Jesus" which I translated into English. In my opinion, the power of translation is immense in giving a poet's work a new lease of life. It also enables those who do not speak a particular language to experience its richness. Nirendranath Chakraborty's poem Kolkata r Jishu is one of his finest creations in Bengali literature for its simplicity in language, imagery, and universality transcending time and place. I was also commended in the Under 18 Urdu Spotlight Section of 2021 for translating two poems - Inhidam (Demolition) by Nahid Rana and Parinde ki ankh khul jati hain (The Birds Eyes Open) by Sara Shagufta. Translating from Urdu to English proved challenging, Urdu being a language completely outside my comfort zone. However, support from the Rekhta Foundation with online resources and a dictionary proved very useful.

Kolkata's Jesus

No red light at the signal, yet the turbulent pace of the city of Kolkata came to an abrupt halt; adjusting violently
Taxis and private cars, three wheelers, tiger stamped double-deckers.
"He is gone!", they screamed, those running along from either side of the road – porters, vendors, shopkeepers, and customers – like a motionless image on an artist's easel. Each watching in silence, in wobbly feet crossing the road, one side to the other a naked child.

It has rained a while ago in the Chowringhee neighbourhood, now the sunlight, like a long spear descends, piercing the heart of the clouds; enveloping the city of Kolkata in magical light.

Resting my chin on the State bus window I see the sky, I see you. Child of a beggar mother, Infant Jesus of Kolkata, stopping the entire traffic in your mystic spell. The public furore, the impatient driver's grinding teeth, you seem perturbed by none; death looming on either side, juxtaposed in between you walk along in unstable steps. As if humanity was embodied, in the joy of taking the first step you wanting to conquer the entire universe in your fist. Hence, in wobbly feet you move from one end of the world to the other.

Reading Makes Us Think



In English this term, students have been reading books that make us think about issues in the news. Year 7 have enjoyed studying the novel 'The Way Past Winter' by Kiran Millwood Hargrave, thinking about our treatment of the natural world and climate change. Many students have also been considering the experience of migrants and refugees attempting to reach the UK. Some Year 7 forms have been reading the graphic novel 'Illegal' co-written by Eoin Colfer and Andrew Donkin with illustration by Giovanni Rigano and Year 9 students have had the opportunity to read 'The Crossing' by Manjeet Mann (Winner of the Costa Children's Book Award 2021) in advance of her visit to school next half term.



Here are some students' opinions on two of these books which we highly recommend to students, parents and staff alike.


The Crossing' was an interesting and touching book. This book follows the story of a boy (Samuel) from Eritrea who after his father's death escapes from his country's violence and mandatory enlistment and a girl from the UK (Natalie) whose mother recently died. The Crossing' takes you on a journey from both of these characters' perspectives as you see Natalie's hard times coming to terms with her mother's death and broken family while Samuel desperately tries to keep going on his journey to England. I loved the development of the characters and how they have come so far by the end of the book figuratively and literally. The two stories though different are carefully intertwined and linked through the book.

At first sight I thought it would be a tough read due to the poetry format but the book was simple to follow along and the writing in verse made the book interesting to read and look at. The change of font for each point of view made the separate stories simple to follow and I enjoyed how each verse linked to the next.

The story is told extremely well and reveals the very real struggle and desperation that so many refugees face looking for a better life. It illustrates the sad truth that often after coming so far in pursuit of that better life it isn't always waiting for you and struggles await refugees no matter where they go.

Reading 'The Crossing' with my friends was a great experience as it was nice to have people to discuss ideas with about the book after reading it. I would definitely do it again and recommend 'The Crossing' to any other readers. *Chioma Ndozi 9X*

The story made me think about the hardships that refugees have to feel every day, and how brave they are for the hope they carry within them as they look and search for a better life and home. I liked how it was written in verse as the short lines of the stanzas conveyed the emotions of the characters more effectively. The story follows two teenagers from different backgrounds navigating through struggles; Natalie's family life is collapsing and Sammy flees from his home country, Eritrea, to Europe, in hopes of starting a better life. 

The characters are very selfless, brave and extremely considerate.

It is amazing how although 'Illegal' is a fictional story however it could reflect the life of many refugees across the world. I would rate this book a 4/5 as the characters' stories are very interesting and a lot of the time, there are cliffhangers at the end of chapters. Overall, I would highly recommend this book to anyone who is after a fun read!

'Illegal' is the story of Ebo, a 12 year old boy, who flees from poverty, zero opportunities, a drunken uncle and his home: a little village in Africa. Sisi, his older sister, had run away to Europe months ago, and soon after his brother Kwame was gone too. Before he can even think about a boat to get him to Europe, he will have to make the perilous journey across the Sahara Desert. The boat he manages to find a passage on, a little dingy, designed to carry 6 people, was carrying 14.

This was the first graphic novel that I read and it definitely won't be the last! In my opinion, I love the theme and idea of the book because many young people aren't as aware of what is going on in the world and the problem that refugees are going through. The ending is another thing that I like about the novel, as it isn't what many people would expect. In addition, I also like how the story was structured; one chapter in the past and the next in the present.

I will definitely be recommending 'Illegal' to everyone that I know, because this novel is perfect for everyone to read no matter your age.

Careers Information

Dr Rose, Careers Lead

Many thanks to those who have responded to our Careers Provision Survey. An initial read of the feedback suggested that you wanted more information about the opportunities on offer, of which there are many!

If your child participates in any of these activities or any other Work Experience Activities – please make sure that you ask them to send me an email telling me about what they have done, with what company and when, so that we can update our records.

The <u>careers section</u> on our website also contains some useful links and a copy of our careers programme for the year.





Careers Interviews

All students in Year 11 have had a careers interview with our independent Careers' Adviser, Angela Fawke. In addition to this, Year 12 and Year 9 are currently able to ask for an appointment. She is also available most Thursday's for any student to pop and see her to ask questions at lunchtime in the library.



We hope that more students will be able to complete Work Experience Placements this summer than for the last couple of years and we are promoting the following opportunities for our older students.

- **Year 11**. We are asking the students to arrange a 5-day work experience placement after their GCSE examinations. Ideally, this should be completed between Wednesday 29th June and Friday 22nd July, avoiding Monday 11th July (our Sixth Form Induction Day). We are planning a virtual programme for students who are unable to arrange a face-to-face placement.
- **Year 12**. We are asking our Year 12 students to complete a period of work experience during enrichment week (20th 25th June) in the summer term. More information about this will follow shortly, but many students are already proactively seeking placements. They may also complete placements during the school holidays, but should avoid asking for time off in the school term.
- Year 12 and Year 13. Sixth form students are able to request permission to undertake regular Work Experience/Work Placements/Voluntary work during their afternoon study time. In order to take advantage of this we request that a parent/carer writes to the Headteacher requesting permission to attend. This letter should indicate the nature of the placement, when it is proposed to take place and how it relates to their future aspirations. Permission to attend will be given if the placement is appropriate in terms of their aspirations, ongoing attendance, work and progress. Once permission is granted, students must forward the agreement to me, Dr Rose, so that the appropriate documentation can be completed.

Specific Opportunities

University Hospitals Birmingham Trust Work Experience Programme

The largest free national work experience programme for aspiring medical, dental and veterinary students has returned. This was developed last year in partnership with Birmingham Universities Hospitals Trust and it is free for students in Years 10-13 year to participate in. These are E-learning courses that students can complete in their own time. Students have 1 month to complete each session, and once they have completed the programme they will receive a certificate from Medic Mentor and UHB as evidence of their participation. Medical schools are accepting virtual work experience as an alternative to in-person work experience in light of the pandemic and reduced access to placements.

Participation in the virtual work experience will also provide students (and their parents) with several opportunities to speak to doctors, dentists and vets continuously throughout the academic year. They will be able to do this on Tuesday evenings and most weekends, for free. They can also call the Mentor Helpline number 01530 417 299 from 10am-5pm Mon-Fri if they would like to advice on careers or applying to medical, dental or vetinary school. Mostly this number is manned by Doctors. Medic Mentor is a non-profit social enterprise and all of their proceeds are reinvested in supporting students to make informed career decisions.


